NAVHS competitions provide individuals and programs the opportunity to virtually compete and earn points toward show and year-end high-point awards.

Our competitions are open to the following:

- Individuals with physical, cognitive, or emotional disabilities
- Hippotherapy Participants
- Veterans
- Neurotypical Individuals who participate in adaptive programs on academy horses.

Beyond fostering a sense of accomplishment, we aim to create a rewarding experience that celebrates participants' goals, determination, and perseverance.

Our competitions support and empower adaptive programs with opportunities to provide participants competitive shared experiences, foster unity, encourage engagement along with rewards directly for programs.

Who is eligible to compete in our In-Hand Series

In order to participate, a competitor must

- Adaptive Status. Have a medically diagnosed condition that causes a permanent impairment that can be measured objectively.
- Veteran status. Be or have been a member of our National Forces,
- **Academy status** Be a participant of an Adaptive riding program, taking lessons on a horse who is a lesson horse.

Classes, Divisions and Sections

Competitors are responsible for choosing their eligibility status and division.

- Competitors are responsible for entering their correct class(s)
- Competitors are only permitted to participant in one division and discipline per show
- Classes and Divisions are based on Eligibility Status
- Sections are based upon Age and/or Discipline
- Each competitor is eligible to compete in 3 classes but it is not required.

Eligibility Status.

- Individual, instructor, trainer or program is responsible for choosing the eligibility status.
- Competitors can only participate under 1 status during a show year.

Veteran Academy Adaptive

Sections

Age

- Competition show age is determined what a competitors age is on Jan1 of the current competition year.
- A competitor will compete at that age for the entire show year. .
- No changing age sections during the show year

Disciplines

The traditional tack, attire and manner of communication with the horse which falls under one of the following categories:

English Western

Divisions

Supported

Maiden Walk Only

An Assistant Handler is required and zero to two side-walkers permitted. The assistant handler will maintain control of the horse at all times.

Maiden Walk/Trot

An Assistant Handler is required and zero to two side-walkers are permitted. The assistant handler will maintain control of the horse at all times.

Novice Walk/Trot

An Assistant Handler is required and zero to two side-walkers are permitted. The assistant handler will maintain control of the horse at all times.

Limited Support

Intermediate Walk Only

A spotter is required, which will remain at the horse's head, and zero to two side-walkers are permitted. The horse will be handled by only the competitor. Any assistance from the support team will be penalized, except in a safety first situation. Judges discretion

Advanced Intermediate Walk

A spotter is required, which will remain within approximately 10 feet from the horse's head and no side-walkers are permitted. The horse will be handled by only the competitor. Any assistance from the spotter will be penalized, except in a safety first situation. Judges discretion

Intermediate Walk/Trot

A spotter is required, which will remain at the horse's head and zero to two side-walkers are permitted. The horse will be handled by only the competitor. Any assistance from the support team will be penalized, except in a safety first situation. Judges discretion

Advanced Intermediate Walk/Trot

A spotter is required, which will remain within approximately 10 feet from the horse's head and no side-walkers are permitted. The horse will be handled only by the competitor. Any assistance from the spotter will be penalized. Except in a safety first situation. Judges discretion

Independent (No Support)

Advanced Walk

Handlers will present independently at the walk. Handlers must have a spotter who, at their discretion, will remain in the center of the ring or just outside of the course area. Any outside assistance will be penalized, except in a safety first situation. Judges discretion

Advanced Walk/Trot

Handlers will present independently at the walk and trot. Handlers must have a spotter who, at their discretion, will remain in the center of the ring or just outside of the course area. Any assistance from the spotter will be penalized, except in a safety first situation. Judges discretion

In Hand Classes

In-Hand Obstacles

Competitors are judged on successfully completing each obstacle, the competitor's ability to communicate with the horse, and the proper use of aids. The competitor's attempt to complete an obstacle properly will be considered more important than the horse's performance.

Showmanship Pattern Only

Competitors will be judged on the competitor's showmanship, ability to communicate with the horse and proper use of aids while executing the pattern. Results as shown by the performance of the horse are not to be considered more important than showmanship of the competitor.

Obstacle Showmanship

Competitors are judged on successfully completing each obstacle, their showmanship, ability to communicate with the horse and proper use of aids. The competitor's attempt to properly complete the course correctly will be considered more important than the horse's performance.

At Liberty Obstacle

Competitors are judged on horsemanship skills by successfully completing each obstacle without a lead rope or touching the horse.

NOTE: This is only open to independent competitors

Division and Class Specifications

Supported

Maiden Walk

- 301. Maiden Walk Only In-hand Obstacles- Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles and a halt.
- 311. Maiden Walk Only Showmanship Pattern will consist of walk halt transitions, simple turns and straight lines
- 321. Maiden Walk Only Obstacle Showmanship Course will consist of a walk halt transition, a minimum of 3 obstacles and a halt.

Maiden Walk Trot or Jog

- 302. Maiden Walk/Trot or Jog In-Hand Obstacles Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles and a halt.
- 312. Maiden Walk/Trot or Jog Showmanship Pattern will consist of walk trot or Jog transitions, simple turns, a halt, in straight lines.
- 322. Maiden Walk/Trot or Jog Obstacle Showmanship Course will consist of a walk trot transitions, a minimum of 3 obstacles and a halt.

Novice Walk/Trot or Jog

- 303. Novice Walk/Trot or Jog In-Hand Obstacles Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles and a halt
- 313. Novice Walk/Trot or Jog Showmanship Pattern will consist of a walk trot or Jog transitions, simple turns, a halt, in straight lines.
- 323. Novice Walk/Trot or Jog Obstacle Showmanship Course will consist of a walk trot transitions, a minimum of 3 obstacles and a halt.

Limited Support

Intermediate Walk Only

- 304. Intermediate Walk Only In-hand Obstacles- Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles and a halt.
- 314. Intermediate Walk Only Showmanship Pattern will consist of walk halt transitions, simple turns in straight lines.
- 324. Intermediate Walk Only Obstacle Showmanship Course will consist of a walk halt transitions, a minimum of 3 obstacles and a halt.

Advanced Intermediate Walk Only

- 305. Advanced Intermediate Walk Only In-hand Obstacles- Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles and a halt.
- 315. Advanced Intermediate Walk Only Showmanship Pattern will consist of walk halt transitions, simple turns in straight lines.
- 325. Advanced Intermediate Walk Only Obstacle Showmanship Course will consist of a walk halt transitions, a minimum of 3 obstacles and a halt.

Intermediate Walk/Trot or Jog

306. Intermediate Walk/Trot or Jog In-Hand Obstacles - Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles and a halt

316. Intermediate Walk/Trot or Jog Showmanship - Pattern will consist of a walk - trot or Jog transitions, simple turns, a halt, in straight lines.

326. Intermediate Walk/Trot or Jog Obstacle Showmanship - Course will consist of a walk - trot transitions, a minimum of 3 obstacles and a halt.

Advanced Intermediate Walk/Trot or Jog

- 307. Advanced Intermediate Walk/Trot or Jog In-Hand Obstacles Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles and a halt
- 317. Advanced Intermediate Walk/Trot or Jog Showmanship Pattern will consist of a walk trot or Jog transitions, simple turns, a halt, in straight lines.
- 327. Advanced Intermediate Walk/Trot or Jog Obstacle Showmanship Course will consist of a walk trot transitions, a minimum of 3 obstacles and a halt.

Independent (No Support)

Advanced Walk

- 308. Advanced Walk Only In-hand Obstacles- Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles and a halt.
- 318. Advanced Walk Only Showmanship Pattern will consist of walk halt transitions, simple turns in straight lines.
- 328. Advanced Walk Only Obstacle Showmanship Course will consist of a walk halt transitions, a minimum of 3 obstacles and a halt.
- 330. Advanced Walk Only Liberty Course will consist of a minimum of three obstacles and a halt

Advanced Walk/Trot or Jog

- 309. Advanced Walk/Trot or Jog In-Hand Obstacles Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles and a halt
- 319. Advanced Walk/Trot or Jog Showmanship Pattern will consist of a walk trot or jog transitions, simple turns, a halt, in straight lines.
- 329. Advanced Walk/Trot or Jog Obstacle Showmanship Course will consist of a walk trot transitions, a minimum of 3 obstacles and a halt.
- 331. Advanced Walk/Trot/Jog Liberty Course will consist of a minimum of three obstacles, including a trot/jog and a halt.

General Information

Any questions/concerns can be forwarded to show management. Show management and/or the appropriate jury will clarify any questions concerning tack, equipment, attire or soundness.

Attire

- It is recommended that all competitors wear a protective ASTM/SEI approved helmet, english or
 western, with full chin harness fastened at all times while handling the horse. A western hat may be
 affixed over the helmet in western events.
- English and western attire will follow traditional practices with the exception of acceptable adaptation equipment.
- Traditional discipline appropriate clothing is requested to participate in a class.

- Appropriate and suitable footwear required
- Tall boots and chaps are not required.

Tack and Equipment

- Competitors may use appropriate and acceptable adaptive equipment without penalty
- Halters are required for all classes. NO BRIDLES
- English and western equipment will follow traditional practices with the exception of acceptable adaptation equipment.
- Chains on leads are permitted if under the chin. Not permitted to be over the horse's nose.

Horses/Ponies

- Horses/Ponies must be serviceable sound
- Horses/Ponies should be suitable

Assistance

- Any assistance from a competitors support team will be penalized at the judges discretion except in a safety situation.
- All in hand and liberty class calls must be announced to the competitor while recording. The
 videographer or an assistant may announce the directions. Only the provided directions may be
 announced to the competitor, if necessary the call may be repeated once. No other assistance is
 permitted besides safety assistance.
- Outside assistance will be penalized at the judge's discretion.

Arena

- The arena should measure approximately 60' wide by 120' long, or as close as possible depending on your facility.
- Obstacles and patterns are built around these dimensions.
- The arena must be defined.
- Obstacles and patterns should be designed as closely as possible to the provided directions and course maps

Video Submission Information

- No special equipment needed. A mobile phone will work
- Videographer Placement: The videographer needs to stand and record from the following locations, (based on dressage letter placement

Obstacle Course- Outside of the course behind letter "I"

Showmanship - Outside of the pattern at approximately letter "X"

Obstacle Showmanship - Outside of the course behind letter "I"

Liberty - Outside of the course behind letter "I"

- The phone/camera should be held horizontally
- For best results try not to be facing into the sun. Do your best
- An indoor/covered arena is acceptable if the lighting is good.
- The better the lighting conditions, the better the video will look.
- The sound must be turned ON. Videos without sound will not be judged
- Enable the DO NOT DISTURB feature while videoing
- Videos can not stop and start. They need to be unedited and continuous

The video

- Competitor should be in the start position to begin
- Video must be continuous from start to finish.
- Begin video with the videographer videoing another device displaying the date and time.
- Without stopping the recording, show a document, whiteboard or paper, showing the rider's name, class number and class name you are recording. DO NOT STOP RECORDING
- Focus the camera on the competitor and horse.
- Videographer or assistant should now Announce "you are now being judged".
- Do not physically move, stay in the required 'letter' location.
- Zoom in and out to have a clear view of entire competitor and horse at all times
- When the class is finished, zoom in on the competitor and horse and continue videoing for approximately 3 seconds.
- Absolutely no editing, no stopping and starting of video while completing the class.
- Please attempt to keep all videos between 3 5 minutes. No longer would be appreciated.

Year End Awards

To be eligible for year end awards competitors and programs must declare and pay the fee by the closing date for registration of the competition in order for points to count.

A minimum of entry into 2 shows required for competitions and programs towards year end awards.
